The following includes program data from 65 women who were actively enrolled in Healthy Start from Sept. 1, 2014 – March 30, 2015:

Prior to enrollment in Healthy Start

- 20 women (31%) lived with relatives or friends between 3-5 months on a temporary basis during the 12 months before program intake
- 20 women (31%) spend 6 or more nights in a shelter or temporary facility during the 12 months before program intake

At point of enrollment in Healthy Start

- 15 women (23%) were not living in a stable housing situation at the time of program intake
- 28 women (43%) were living in a somewhat stable housing situation at the time of program intake
- 15 women (23%) were identified as high risk for housing instability at the time of program intake
- 5 women (6%) were living in a shelter, temporary treatment facility or couch hopping at the time of program intake

Find attached the overall risk levels of 47 Healthy Start clients enrolled in our most intensive home visiting/case management services.

Thanks for meeting with us today. I learned a lot and will continue to encourage the Healthy Start CAN to be active in housing discussions.
