On December 28, 1972, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

Representatives of several area peace groups met from 7:45 PM to 10:30 PM at the University of Minnesota Newman Center December 28, 1972, to formulate plans to protest recent intensification of United States bombing in Southeast Asia. [Redacted] of the New American Movement (NAM) suggested a demonstration at the offices of Minnesota United States Senators Hubert H. Humphrey and Walter F. Mondale and United States Congressman Donald M. Fraser.

The May, 1972, edition of "New American Movement," NAM monthly newspaper, states: "NAM's goal is democratic socialism, a society characterized by economical, racial, and sexual equality, and by collective ownership and democratic control in the means of production." (U)

[Redacted] and Marvin Davidov of the Honeywell Project, a Minneapolis group formed to urge the Honeywell Corporation, Minneapolis, to halt production of war material, argued that picketing demonstrations and discussions with Senators and Congressmen had, over the years, proved fruitless and, consequently, a more dramatic form of action was preferable. Davidov exhibited a leaflet, a copy of which is appended to this memorandum. This leaflet in part states, "Men and women who work in munitions plants have an obvious
